





Sacramentality: People Part II: The Body

The way we feel about the human body has always seemed to be in a tug-of-war: some believe the body to be a useless shell waiting to be shed; some see it as a vehicle of work and no more: some see it as an object of lust, or even sometimes as the most important part of the human person. The body is for us many things, and is in-and-of itself important sacramentally, and important for our salvation: for it is by our bodies that we are able to give thanks and praise to God. God created man and woman as physical beings, and we know that God does not do anything without purpose. Our bodies, and the senses that come with our bodies, help us to experience the world God created for us: we see the beauty of a sunrise, we smell freshly baked bread, we touch the soft fabric of our own clothing. And since we are such physical beings, we worship with our bodies in a way no other creature can. We stand to show honor to God; we kneel to show our humility; we sing to praise him, and we taste his Body and his Blood in Holy Communion. Our bodies are significant to our worship, and also signs which point to sacred realities: "Do you not know that you are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you...for the temple of God, which you are, is holy" (1 Corinthians 3:16,17).

Reflection

- How do I use my body to praise the Lord?
- Am I respecting the gift of my body, or am I mistreating it with drugs, alcohol, or other destructive habits?
- This week at Mass, can I use the gift of my body to its fullest potential, being respectful and modest with my own body and towards the bodies and minds of others?
